Strategic Planning was completed this year and one of the goals identified for Agape is increasing our community presence. Agape has done a great job of that over the last year by rolling out the Ribbons of Hope fundraising campaign in November, holding a vigil in December to honour the National Day of Remembrance and Action on Violence Against Women, holding our Purple Gala in March in honour of International Women's Day. Agape also put on the Teddy Bear Fun Day in June which was a huge success. Agape staff have also been attending many other events in the community as well as collaborating with other agencies.

The Board and I look forward to continued success with the organization and are truly grateful for the committed relationships we have developed. Not only within the organization but also within all levels of the government as well as private, corporate and community support.

## Message from the Treasurer

This has been an exciting year for Agape House with the purchase of a new building and renovations starting in both our locations. The Shelter continues to work hard to ensure all cleaning and occupancy protocols are being followed which results in consistent expenses for the Shelter. We continue to see our community making donations even during these challenging times of increasing inflation and living expenses. We are truly grateful for our unrelenting community that invests in the work that we do.

Here are the highlights of the fiscal position of Eastman Crisis Centre for the fiscal year ended March 31, 2024.

- We saw our bed nights increase as compared to the previous year. We were busy all throughout last year and our bed nights each month were higher than last year resulting in much higher per diems. In FY2023, our bed nights were 1,858 resulting in \$77,204 of Per Diems compared to this year, of 2,680 bed nights with \$113,943 in Per Diems.
- Our community continued to come through. We were able to host a fundraising event for International Women's Day with a new spin, which was a great success. We received \$18,892 from the event, which contributed to a total of \$110,750 donations/fundraising for the year. This was a slight decrease from last year's \$129,357. We are truly grateful for our generous community. While donations dropped off in the summer, we saw an increase in November, December, and February.
- Expenses were higher than the previous year (FY2024 - \$1,200,184; FY2023 - \$870,145). A few expenses were up including salaries and benefits, amortization on our new building, education, and, professional fees. While other expenses were down like medication expenses and membership fees. Salaries across the board in Admin and Shelter, Children's and Follow Up have increased since the previous year. This is due to an increase in wages and trying to double staff shifts.
- Agape House was also able to offer increased training opportunities to staff that included Solutions Focused Therapy, Motivational Interviewing, and Indigenous Cultural Training. These were 75% funded from the Canada-Manitoba Job Grant. And allow us to offer the best care we can to our community.

The net effect was a FY2024 surplus of \$145,660 (FY2023 - \$247,962).

As we conclude the 2023-24 fiscal year, I am pleased to reflect on our accomplishments and address the significant challenges that lie ahead. This year has been marked by meaningful progress and growth, and your continued support has been instrumental in our journey.

This year, Agape House successfully doubled our staffing around the clock, enabling us to provide continuous and comprehensive support to those in need. We continue to grapple with a shortage of space and funding, which limits our capacity to fully meet the rising demands of our region. As we move forward, our focus remains on leveraging our successes to tackle these challenges. We are committed to seeking new solutions and continuing our mission to provide critical support to those impacted by domestic violence.

In closing, I would like to extend my heartfelt gratitude to several key supporters. To our Board of Directors, your trust, dedication, and active involvement have been crucial to our success. To my colleagues, your diverse strengths and unwavering commitment inspire and drive us forward as a unified Team. I also want to express our deep appreciation to the Gender-Based Violence Program (GBVP) and the Manitoba Association of Women's Shelters (MAWS) for their ongoing encouragement and support. Thank you to our generous community for your financial contributions, volunteer efforts, and advocacy. Your support makes a meaningful difference and helps us continue our vital work.

## Highlights and Successes

### ACQUISITIONS & STAFFING

We acquired an additional house, which has provided a new location for our counseling sessions and a dedicated clothing closet for our clients! We are also preparing for renovations at the shelter to increase efficiency and expand our space. With the successful completion of our goal of double staffing, we were able to provide more comprehensive support to our clients and improve the well-being of our employees. Additionally, we introduced a wage increase, recognizing the hard work and commitment of Agape House staff. Through various grants, we have also expanded community education for our team to increase our skills and knowledge on the job. We were thrilled to implement Izzy, a new chat line which provides an online 24/7 chatbox for those in crisis to reach out and receive immediate support.

### EVENTS & AWARENESS

We have actively organized and participated in community events, such as our December vigil, the Purple Gala in celebration of International Women’s Day, Moose Hide Day, and Teddy Bear Fun Day. These events strengthen our community ties and raise awareness about our services. The Community Services Recovery Fund also made it possible for us to run our Purple Ribbon Campaign in November, which is Domestic Violence Awareness month. With the support of a grant we were able to commission a promotional video featuring our staff to raise awareness about domestic violence and outlining our services. Adjacent to this, we are excited to have a brand-new website rolling out which will better display our organization and the work we do.

### COMMUNITY SUPPORT & VOLUNTEERS

Agape House wishes to thank the two amazing photographers who generously donated their time and skills this year to take beautiful pictures for us, Mélanie Bremaud and Lydia Peters Photography. Our team of volunteers grew significantly this year, assisting us with a variety of projects such as lawn care, childminding, events, fundraising, canvassing, and programs. Their contributions and dedication is truly invaluable to us as an organization, and we couldn’t do it without them!

### CHALLENGES



## Operations & Programs

Agape House is a charitable, non-profit organization funded through a grant from the Provincial Government Department of Family Services, as well as through community donations. We are governed by a volunteer Board of Directors. As one of 10 women’s shelters in Manitoba, Agape House- Eastman Crisis Centre Inc. serves an area that extends north to Beausejour, south to the U.S. border, west to Winnipeg and east to the Ontario border. Agape House opened its doors in December 1985, out of a three-bedroom bungalow. Today, the shelter has 16 beds, and in an average year sees over 200 clients and responds to over 1,000 crisis calls from the area.

## Our Services


- **Support 24/7** – We operate 24 hours per day, 7 days per week, 365 days per year providing a safe place for those experiencing family violence – all services are provided at no cost.
- **24-Hour Crisis Line** – We answer a 24-hour, toll-free regional crisis line which offers crisis counselling and referrals to appropriate resources.
- **Shelter Services** – for those in shelter – we offer crisis and ongoing counselling, assistance with medical, legal, and social services, and the basic daily provisions: food, clothing and personal care items.
- **Community Support** – We run empowerment groups for women on various topics, including dealing with abuse, parenting support, self-esteem and more.
- **Counselling and Care** – For those who may not need to stay in shelter – we offer free counselling and support around issues related to family violence and abuse.
- **Outreach** – We offer counselling, information, referrals, resources, and groups for women and youth in our catchment area. Outreach promotes general awareness of our shelter and services, and aims to connect with community organizations and other service providers.
- **Transition Homes** – We have two interim housing units which are in place to help women make the transition toward independent living, while allowing for access to support services.
- **Educational Services** – We offer no-cost public education workshops, and presentations in our region - Topics include: Family Violence Awareness, Healthy Relationships, Supporting Survivors Within a Faith Community, Family Violence Awareness for Police/RCMP, and more. We are able to adapt our material to suit any audience.

We aim to promote awareness of family violence issues within a variety of contexts, as well our shelter, services and programs. We work proactively with other agencies in the South Eastman region, Winnipeg and within the Province of Manitoba to address issues of domestic violence and abuse.

“SHELTERS OFFER A CONTINUUM OF CARE THAT CAN EXTEND LONG PAST THE TIME AN INDIVIDUAL RESIDES IN A SHELTER.”

“Overall, 94% of shelters indicated that they offer services, support, and programming to non-residents. These supports are available both in-person and remotely, with more than half of all shelter saying that survivors could access services and support through either method.” This includes, but is not limited to, safety planning tools, legal advocacy, therapy and counselling, transportation, and financial literacy programs.

While providing safe shelter is important for those fleeing violence, this is only one aspect of the work done in these shelters. Non-residential services and supports are a way for shelters to meet people where they are at. For those who are unable, or not ready, shelters offer a path to healing through community connection, programming, and individualized supports. Shelters offer a continuum of care that can extend long past the time an individual resides in a shelter.”

Much of the funding shelters receive is focused on providing a bed and supports to those fleeing violence, while fewer resources are allocated to non-residential services and prevention work. This is reflective of the top response to the challenges of providing non-residential supports, which was funding, followed closely by staffing issues.” Though struggling to navigate these issues, among other challenges, shelters continue to be innovative regardless. Some examples include increased inter-agency collaborations, improved staff training and support, and adoption of new technology.


